In the name of God Amen: I Bridget Skinner (of Pisford) Widdow, being perfect in memory (thanks be given to God) though sick in body, doe ordaine this my last will & testament in manner & forme following: First I bequeath my Soul unto Almighty God my most mercyfull Father, and to Jesus Christ my redeemer, and to the Holy Ghost my Comforter; believing to be saved by the death and and rebirth of my Saviour Christ, and my body to the Ground, in the certain hope of my glorious Resurrection to eternal life,) to be buryed by my husband; and for my worldly goods I thus bestow of them: Imprimis I give to my Sonn Robert the furnace, the racks and all other iron things belonging to the chimney & all the house timber. I give to his wife the best bedstead, to his sonns their Grandfathers Books, to his daughter Mary the great Chest in the little parlour:

Item I give to my sonn Edmond the best feather bed and after his decease I bestow it upon his sonn John; alsoe I give give unto my sonn Edmond the great brasse pott and the great pann Item I give unto my three daughters the chest in the little chamber and all that there in is to be divided equally amongst them:

Item I give unto my sister foster twenty shillings & a pare of sheets:

Item to all my antient servents and also to the servants that now are, one shilling a peace: Item all the rest of my money unbequeathed I give unto my Sonn Edmond whom I make my sole and only exequitor of this my last will and testament:

Item I appoynt Mr Elborrough & Mr Greenhill overseers of this my last will and testament: In witnes whereof I have hereunto put my hand & seale this twelth day of January in the fifth year of the reigne of our Sovereigne Lord King Charles, King of England, Scotland, France & Ireland, Defender of the Faith: etc: And in the year of our Lord God one thousand six hundred ~~~~ twenty & nine: 1629
